

Biosecurity

Biosecurity refers to a set of measures designed to protect a property from the entry and spread of pests, weeds, diseases and contaminants when visiting or working on a property.

Transmission Company Victoria (TCV) will take reasonable steps whenever it accesses private properties for surveys, assessments or consultation to understand and manage biosecurity risks, developing and implementing appropriate measures to prevent impacts to property operations and the local environment.

TCV's biosecurity management is guided by TCV's Biosecurity Policy. The Biosecurity Policy was developed in line with the Essential Services Commission Land Access Code of Practice (CoP) which was effective from 1 March 2024. The Land Access CoP was also developed in consultation with Agriculture Victoria.



Responsible Biosecurity Management

TCV has a responsibility to minimise the risk of its activities introducing pests, weeds, animal/plant diseases and contaminants onto private or public land. This risk commonly occurs via the movement of vehicles and machinery.

Weed seeds and other animal/plant disease spores are small and can be easily and unknowingly 'tracked in' by vehicles and machinery when they contain soil or organic material on their tracks, tyres or outer frame. They can also be tracked in from material on boots with soil stuck to the sole.

TCV is taking the following steps to manage the risk of introducing pests, weeds or diseases into landholders' properties:

Training: TCV will ensure all project staff entering a private property are trained on Biosecurity management and have the necessary skills and tools to understand your Biosecurity risks and how they will be managed. Procedures that comply with relevant environmental legislation and regulations, the Land Access CoP, and TCV's Biosecurity Policy have been developed which must be followed by project staff.

Planning: Prior to entering property, we will identify potential risks through pre-existing information and in consultation with landholders, with relevant controls put in place to be followed.

Communication: A Land Access Agreement (LAA) will be negotiated between the landholder and the project, setting out the detail of who, when and how the project team will access your property, including biosecurity requirements.

Washdown procedures: Prior to entering and leaving your property (either via a public road or via a neighbouring private property) where required, vehicle tyres and mudguards, boots and any machinery will undergo a cleaning process. A checklist will be completed each

time, and confirmation that the procedures have been followed can be provided to the landholder as required.

Recording of requirements: In addition to the standard or agreed biosecurity processes that will be followed, if any new biosecurity risks are identified they will be discussed with the landholder and any relevant documentation will be updated.

Reporting: At the completion of each property access TCV will report any environmental impact during works caused by TCV or its contractors to the landholder, along with any steps proposed for mitigation and/or restoration. This will also be recorded in TCV's incident management system and an investigation by TCV management will be completed. At the completion of each property access TCV will also provide you with a report within 15 business days, outlining the details of access, and the activities undertaken in relation to biosecurity management.

Ongoing assessment and review

TCV and its Landholder Liaison team will monitor the Federal Government's Outbreak page (www.outbreak.gov.au) for the latest news on new or known risks to Australia and Victoria. Any required updates to plans will be made based on any new requirements and will be communicated to applicable landholders.

Most importantly, we encourage you to discuss any biosecurity and property access requests or concerns with your assigned Landholder Liaison.
